
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OVERVIEW OF THE ISLAND DANCER II AND FIJI

WHERE IS FIJI?

Republic of the Fiji Islands is an island nation in the South Pacific Ocean east of Vanuatu, west of Tonga and south of Tuvalu. The country occupies an archipelago of about 322 islands, of which 106 are permanently inhabited, and 522 islets. The two major islands, Viti Levu and Vanua Levu,



account for 87% of the population.

WHAT KIND OF DIVING IS FOUND AROUND FIJI ?

Island Dancer II itineraries are varied to optimize diving in areas where the diving conditions are best throughout the year. During your dive cruise, you will visit undersea pinnacles, swim throughs and be amazed by creatures large and so small you may miss them if you cruise by too quickly!

Throughout the week aboard the Island Dancer II, an intimate 10 passenger yacht, guests will depart Suva to explore the reefs, bommies and walls of Nigali Pass, Wakaya, Koro and Namena Islands. Known as the soft coral capital, the brilliant colors on display will dazzle even the most experienced divers and photographers. Drift dives with eagle rays, mantas, turtles, sharks and giant groupers are also on the itinerary.

Clownfish, pygmy seahorses, ornate ghost pipefish, and a multitude of nudibranchs bring smiles to every dive! With direct flights from several major cities worldwide, it is an easy destination to add to your dive log.

To top off the exiting diving and experience some of Fiji's local culture, a visit to a Fijian village on one of the remote islands is arranged including a Kava ceremony and warrior dance. All guests are required to wear a traditional sulu (sarong or wrap) so either bring your own or we will gladly provide one for you!

IN WHAT TIME ZONE IS FIJI LOCATED?

The time zone is GMT+ 12 hours with no daylight savings time.

WHAT LANGUAGES ARE SPOKEN ONBOARD?

English and Fijian are both the official languages. Onboard the Island Dancer II, our crew will converse in English with guests.

WHAT WEATHER CONDITIONS CAN I EXPECT IN FIJI

Fiji is a destination that offers year round diving. Fiji's climate is generally warm with wet and dry seasons. The wettest months for most regions are mid December to mid April, but the rain falls mainly in the evenings and rarely disrupts daily activities. A light wetsuit is necessary, though some people choose more thermal protection (a 3mm suit) to ensure continued core temperature warmth throughout their visit

WHAT CURRENCY IS USED?

The local currency is the Fijian dollar.

Major credit cards are accepted by most hotels. It is advisable to exchange currency at banks, as the most favorable exchange rates may not be obtained elsewhere. Most banks are open Monday to Friday. It is recommended that you exchange enough for island tipping and small pocket change. Major credit cards are accepted by most restaurants, hotels, car rental companies, and shops. Travelers checks are accepted everywhere.

WHAT DOES MY DANCER PACKAGE INCLUDE?

All staterooms are air-conditioned and fitted with private toilets, showers and sinks. Breakfast (cooked to order), buffet lunch and an elegant meal at dinner with table side service are served daily in addition to fresh mid-morning and mid-afternoon snacks. Beverages (including soft drinks and local beer and wine) are complimentary while onboard. Bathrobes and some toiletries are available for your use onboard. The yacht is equipped with hair dryers in each stateroom. Linens are changed mid-week and fresh towels are placed in each stateroom daily as needed. Filled tanks, weights and weight belts are included.



FOR WHAT ADDITIONAL EXPENSES WILL I BE RESPONSIBLE?

No air transportation is included in the Dancer package. An airport departure tax must be paid at the airport when leaving. Please see the latest rate schedule for departure tax amount. Dive instruction, dive and photo equipment rentals and "Boatique" purchases must be settled on-board prior to departure. There is a 15% government tax and 5% hotel tax charged aboard. Acceptable methods of payment include: US Dollars, local currency, Traveler's Checks, or Credit Cards (Visa or MasterCard). Personal checks are not accepted. Crew gratuities are not included.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF FIJI

The first people of Fiji arrived long before contact with European explorers in the seventeenth century. Pottery excavated from Fijian towns shows that Fiji was settled before or around 1000 BC, although the question of Pacific migration still lingers. The Dutch explorer Abel Tasman visited Fiji in 1643 while looking for the Great Southern Continent. It was not until the nineteenth century, however, that Europeans settled the islands permanently. The islands came under British control as a colony in 1874, and the British brought over Indian contract laborers. It was granted independence in 1970. Democratic rule was interrupted by two military coups in 1987 because the government was perceived as dominated by the Indo-Fijian (Indian) community. The second 1987 coup saw the British monarchy and the Governor General replaced by a non-executive President, and the country changed the long form of its name from Dominion of Fiji to Republic of Fiji (and to Republic of the Fiji Islands in 1997). The coups and accompanying civil unrest contributed to heavy Indian emigration; the population loss resulted in economic difficulties but ensured that Melanesians became the majority.

In 1990, the new Constitution institutionalized the ethnic Fijian domination of the political system. Sitiveni Rabuka, the Lieutenant Colonel who carried out the 1987 coup became Prime Minister in 1992, following elections held under the new constitution. Three years later, Rabuka established the Constitutional Review Commission, which in 1997 led to a new Constitution, which was supported by most leaders of the indigenous Fijian and Indo-Fijian communities. Fiji is re-admitted to the Commonwealth of Nations.

ISLAND DANCER II - TRAVEL INFORMATION

HOW DO I GET TO FIJI?

Your final destination is Suva. The port of entry is usually Nadi where you will claim your luggage and clear customs and immigration. From Nadi you can either take a domestic flight to Suva or travel around the island (approx 3-4 hours) via bus or taxi to Suva.

WHAT TRAVEL DOCUMENTS WILL I NEED?

You are required to possess a passport valid for at least six months from the date of arrival and have proof of return or onward ticketing..

You may also require a Visa. You may qualify for a free Visa or a Visa on arrival depending on your citizenship. Please contact your local Embassy or Consulate for your destination or review the requirements on one of the many travel visa information websites.

WHAT SHOULD I KNOW ABOUT CUSTOMS AND IMMIGRATION?

At the airport, customs formalities are usually quick and trouble free. Tourists are allowed articles for use during their stay. These include items of personal adornment, wearing apparel, toilet requisites and any portable articles which someone can reasonably be expected to use during their stay.

WHAT ARE THE EMBARKATION AND DISEMBARKATION TIMES?

Embarkation will begin at 12:00 noon on the first day of charter and the Island Dancer II typically sails immediately. All guests will disembark at 7:30 am on the final day of charter. An early disembarkation and transfer can be arranged for guests who have a flight departing prior to the scheduled disembarkation time for a nominal fee..

HOW DO I GET FROM THE AIRPORT TO ISLAND DANCER II?

A group transfer from the airport to the Island Dancer is provided to guests flying into Suva on the scheduled day of embarkation. This transfer to the yacht, which is about a 45 minute drive, is scheduled between 6:00AM – 8:00AM, and is designed to accommodate the majority of guests who arrive on those early morning flights that are most reliable. The preferred early-arriving flight into Suva from Nadi is Air Pacific flight # FJ003. This flight maintains a reliable flight schedule, early flights into Nadi connect easily with this flight, and wait-time between flights is greatly reduced after a long day of travel.

Guests are met at the airport baggage area. Please look for a sign that either has Island Dancer II, or your name on it.

If you are arriving in Suva on a later flight and unable to join the group transfer, then you will need to take a taxi to the Island Dancer II which docks next to the Novotel Hotel (formerly the Trade Winds hotel).

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HOW DO I GET FROM THE HOTEL TO ISLAND DANCER II IF I ARRIVE EARLY?

The Island Dancer II docks next to the Novotel Hotel (formerly known as the Trade Winds Hotel) in Suva. If you arrive early, please make your way to the Novotel Hotel in time for the 12:00 noon boarding. Dancer Fleet's Travel Specialist will be able to arrange airport transfers for you in addition to a hotel accommodation should you arrive a night or two before embarkation.

WHAT DO WE DO ON THE DAY WE DISEMBARK?

Island Dancer II returns to the port of disembarkation on its last day (the night before disembarkation). Your last day with us has been organized to give you time to off gas and enjoy the land sites Suva has to offer.

Final disembarkation will occur at 7:30 am. A group transfer is provided to the airport for guests departing this morning. For guests departing later in the day, if you do not want to travel to the airport with the group, you may relax at the Novotel Hotel and then make your own way to the airport. If you are departing in the afternoon, you may even have time to enjoy one of our shore excursions in the morning as well.

HOW DO I ARRANGE FOR PRE AND POST CHARTER HOTELS AND TRANSFERS?

LiveAboard Vacations, the Dancer Fleet's in-house travel agency has already done the legwork for you and created several package tours that will fit most of your needs. Custom packages are also available. Please inquire with us if your schedule will permit.

DO I NEED TRIP INSURANCE?

We strongly recommend that each guest purchase comprehensive accident, medical, baggage and trip cancellation and interruption insurance when space is reserved. Trip insurance will protect you from financial disappointment if you are prevented from making your scheduled trip due to illness or family illness, or in the event that unforeseen circumstances prevent the airline or yacht from making its scheduled trip. In an event where it is necessary to cancel or interrupt a charter due to weather or any matter beyond the control of Dancer Fleet, there will be no refund or credit issued. We also recommend diving accident insurance. Please inquire with our reservation office for assistance.

ISLAND DANCER II - THE ON-BOARD

IF I AM TRAVELING AS A SINGLE, WILL I HAVE A ROOMMATE?

All rates are quoted on a share basis; therefore, unless you require a guaranteed single room and pay an additional 65% supplement, you will very likely be

sharing your stateroom with one other guest of the same gender.

WHAT TYPE OF CUISINE IS PREPARED?

Meals prepared by our onboard chef consist of an international mix with a local flair. If you have any special dietary requirements, please advise our US office as soon as possible so we can adequately prepare to meet your needs. Certain special dietary and beverage requests may not be available on a consistent basis due to the remote nature of this location.

WHAT KINDS OF BEVERAGES ARE AVAILABLE?

The Dancer's selection includes fruit juices, soft drinks, iced water, tea and coffee and a limited selection of local beer and wine. Fresh milk may not be available, although UHT long life milk is provided onboard. We recommend that you purchase any special brands of alcoholic beverages that you may want to consume onboard the Dancer at the Duty Free Shop at any airport. We encourage you to consume lots of non-alcoholic liquids during the week to avoid dehydration. **REMEMBER: ALCOHOL AND DIVING DO NOT MIX.** Once you consume alcohol, you become a snorkeler until the next day.

WHAT ELECTRICAL CURRENT IS AVAILABLE?

The electrical current on the Island Dancer II is Australian type 240 volts including cabin outlets. Two multi plug USA type 110 volt outlets are available at the battery charging station.

HOW MUCH SHALL I PACK?

Please plan to travel light, as on all live-aboard dive yachts, space is limited. We recommend that you pack your gear in soft luggage such as a duffel bag for easy stowage and to add to your comfort in your cabin, leave those large, rigid suitcases at home. Clothing should be lightweight, comfortable sportswear and swim suits are a must. A light sweater or jacket is ideal for the evenings. Dress aboard is always casual. Light clothing that reflects the sun is best, and a hat is recommended. Evening dress is informal. Additional items you may want to bring are sunscreen, sunglasses, walking shoes and a hat or visor for your time on shore. Hair dryers are provided in each cabin. We recommend you pack your regulator, dive computer, mask, swim suit, change of clothes and essential items in your carry-on bag. This will make it easier in the event your luggage is delayed. Please check with your airline as to what weight restrictions will apply to your carry-on and checked luggage.

WILL WE VISIT ANY VILLAGES ASHORE DURING

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THE CRUISE?

To top off the exciting diving and experience some of Fiji's local culture, a visit to a Fijian village on one of the remote islands is arranged including a Kava ceremony and warrior dance. All guests are required to wear a traditional sulu (sarong or wrap) so either bring your own or we will gladly provide one for you! There is a \$15 fee for this experience that goes to the villages school.

WHAT IF I AM PRONE TO SEA SICKNESS?

Currents and winds may cause moderate movement of the yacht at times. If you have a tendency toward seasickness we strongly urge you to bring some sort of over-the-counter motion sickness medication or consult your doctor about prescription brands, such as the trans-dermal patch or Scopace tablets. Chewable ginger tablets or capsules of powdered ginger have also proved to be very effective natural alternative.

All Dancer crews are trained in first aid and diving accident management. Each yacht is equipped with a complete first aid kit and a high capacity oxygen system. Each yacht also has direct contact with the closest hyperbaric chamber. Since emergency transportation and treatment cost is the responsibility of each guest, we strongly recommend that you dive conservatively and obtain special insurance for divers from Divers Alert Network, Dive Assure or similarly ranked company.

HOW CAN MY FAMILY CONTACT ME IN THE EVENT OF AN EMERGENCY AT HOME?

In the case of emergency your family may contact you by calling our Miami office at 1-800-932-6237 or 305-669-9391 during business hours. If outside of our operating hours, calls may be made to our emergency cell phone number, 305-778-8004. Please reserve calling this number for emergencies only.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS, MAIL, AND E-MAIL

Check with your local cell phone provider for service while visiting the Dancer yacht and it's destination. Island Dancer II is equipped with Satellite based phone and email for emergency communications.

IS SMOKING PERMITTED?

A designated area on the back of the outdoor lido deck is available for smoking. Smoking is not permitted in any other area for any reason.

IS THERE ENTERTAINMENT ONBOARD?

Island Dancer II has a multi-system TV/DVD unit for video camera playback, a compact disc player and cassette deck. If you have a favorite movie, a slide show or a video to share, we encourage you to bring it along! A small library of "books for exchange" is maintained onboard, as well as marine life identification books for reference.

HOW CAN I CELEBRATE A SPECIAL OCCASION?

Our crew is delighted to help you celebrate any special occasion onboard including birthdays, anniversaries, honeymoons or weddings. Kindly advise our US office at least 30 days prior to departure so that we can adequately prepare.

IS IT CUSTOMARY TO OFFER A GRATUITY TO THE CREW?

Aboard Dancer Fleet yachts, gratuities are not included. We prefer that our guests reward our crew based on performance. If the crew performs to your expectations, we suggest that a gratuity of approximately 10% of the published package price be considered normal aboard a live aboard dive yacht. Payment of gratuities is entirely at the discretion of the guest. Payment of gratuities can be by cash, traveler's checks, or credit card (Visa or MasterCard). The crew greatly appreciate cash as local banking fees and government taxes for traveler's checks and credit card processing reduce the amount of gratuity left on a credit card up to 35% in some destinations.

HOW CAN I PAY FOR MY EXPENSES AND PURCHASES ONBOARD?

Each Dancer yacht has a small, onboard "Boatique" which sells a selection of logo clothing, custom jewelry, sundries, diving accessories, batteries, logbooks, etc. A crew member will gladly assist you with your purchases at any time during the week. The US Dollar, local currency, traveler's checks or credit cards (Visa or MasterCard) are accepted onboard. Personal checks are not accepted. There is a 15% government tax and 5% hotel tax charged.

ISLAND DANCER II - DIVING OPERATIONS

HOW MANY DIVES WILL WE DO EACH DAY?

Our guests enjoy up to 5 dives per day, four during the day and one night dive, on the full days we are at sea.

WHAT PAPERWORK WILL I NEED FOR DIVING?

Remember to bring your c-card or proof of certification. The divemaster requires proof of certification before the first dive. You will be required to complete our Cruise Application and Waiver agreement prior to departure for Fiji. Our GIS (Guest Information System) allows guests to complete all required paperwork on-line including the cruise application, waiver agreement, special requests and travel information. If you haven't received a link to access the GIS, please contact a Dancer Fleet agent. Passengers who fail to complete the GIS registration process will be denied boarding. Please remember, many Dancer destinations require complete passenger information prior to departure for itinerary approval by government agencies.

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WHAT IS THE WATER TEMPERATURE – SHOULD I WEAR A WETSUIT?

November through April is the Fijian summer where water temperatures run 80-84F (27-29C) and then start cooling for the winter season. May through October the water ranges 76-79F (25-27C) before starting a climb again for summer. A light wetsuit is recommended for the summer and a heavier one for the winter.

HOW WILL WE DIVE FROM THE ISLAND DANCER II?

Diving is conducted either from the dive deck on the Island Dancer II or from its tender depending on the weather and current conditions present. Our experienced crew will happily provide assistance to divers with special needs. Our crew will hand down cameras and other equipment and to re-board the yacht, guests may remove their gear in the water and hand it up to our staff and simply climb

onboard by way of a ladder.

For your safety, it is recommended that each diver carry an emergency SMB (safety sausage), a Dive Alert or other suitable audible surface signaling device, and mini-strobe light on all dives. If you do not bring any one of these devices with you they are available for rent on board, however, quantities may be limited.

ARE THERE ANY LIMITATIONS OR RESTRICTIONS ON THE DIVING?

All diving onboard the Island Dancer II should be planned as no-decompression dives and conducted within the limits and standards of your certification agency. Solo diving and rebreather diving is not permitted.

CAN I EARN ADVANCED DIVING CERTIFICATIONS OR SPECIALTIES ONBOARD?

Several diving specialty courses are offered on each Dancer yacht. To ensure that an instructor is available and that all required paperwork is complete, 30 days advanced notice is required prior to sailing. **IMPORTANT:** If you intend to receive diving instruction onboard, you must complete a medical statement in advance and return it to Dancer Fleet Inc. prior to the departure date. A doctor's

note will be required if you answer yes to any of the questions on the medical statement. A list of available courses and prices are available on our website.

ARE NITROX FILLS AVAILABLE?

The Island Dancer II is equipped with Nitrox facilities. Nitrox fills of up to 32% are normally available to all certified Nitrox divers for an additional charge. Nitrox dive profiles must be planned and executed with a Nitrox compatible computer. It is recommended that the planned PO2 level be set within the limits of your certifying agency. All Nitrox fills must be analyzed by the divers using the mix and logged prior to each and every dive. Nitrox certifications are usually available onboard to all certified open water divers for an additional charge.

WHAT DIVING EQUIPMENT WILL I NEED TO BRING?

Equipment provided aboard the Island Dancer II includes tanks (80 cu. ft. aluminum with yoke style "K" valves), weights and weight belts. Divers will also need the following equipment:

Basic Required Diving Equipment for Each Diver

- Regulator with alternate air source
- Depth and pressure gauge
- Dive computer
- Buoyancy Compensation Device (BCD)
- Mask / fins / snorkel
- Night Dives: we require at least two light sources on a night dive.

Recommended (Additional) Dive Equipment

- Battery operated tank marker light.
- Dive light w/ extra batteries/charging source

WHAT SAFETY EQUIPMENT DO I NEED TO HAVE?

We suggest that you bring your own to ensure compatibility with your personal equipment. The Island Dancer has a limited supply available for rental by our guests.

Recommended Surface Safety Equipment For Each Diver

- Audible Surface Signaling Device such as a Dive Alert (Air Horn) or an Emergency Whistle of superior quality.
- Visual Surface Signaling Device (Daytime) such as an Inflatable Safety Sausage or similar device.
- Visual Surface Device (Night or Dusk) such as a Personal Mini-Strobe or similar device.

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Additional Recommended Surface Safety Equipment

- Signaling mirror
- Whistle

ARE DIVE GEAR AND PHOTO/VIDEO GEAR AVAILABLE FOR RENT?

Island Dancer II has a limited amount of diving equipment available for rent, so it is critical that you advise our US office staff in advance if you decide you want to rent gear. We offer ScubaPro BCDs with Dive Alerts and ScubaPro regulators. The photo shop offers digital cameras housed in an underwater housing.

I AM A PHOTOGRAPHER – WHAT CAN I EXPECT

Photo opportunities are abundant and no matter what system you have, you will probably experience excellent results. Be sure to pack your photo equipment carefully in a durable carrying case and bring any unique spare parts and back-up equipment with you.

Guests who are shooting digital photography may view their images on the entertainment center in the salon. Please be sure to bring the appropriate connection cables to fit your particular equipment.

Camera Tables: The Island Dancer II has a camera table built into the dive deck for your use.

Charging Stations: There is a charging station in the salon for your use. Transformers are not required as 110v power is available.

Rinse Buckets: There is a “cameras only” rinse bucket on the dive tender for the exclusive use of photographers onboard.

Underwater Privacy: All divers are required to have a buddy with them at all times. In a drift diving situation, photographers are expected to stay with the body of the group. You may move away from the group within reason – providing that the divemaster leading the dive is kept in sight at all times.

CAN I FISH OR SPEARFISH?

Fishing and spear fishing are not available. Spear fishing equipment is prohibited onboard the diving yacht.

| Day 1 (Embark) | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Between 6:00am and 8:00am a group transfer for the 45 minute drive from the airport to the Island Dancer II is provided. The Island Dancer II awaits dockside at the Novotel Hotel (formerly the Trade Winds Hotel) in Suva. The vessel sets a course for Wakaya at approximately 12:00 noon (weather dependant). Guests are treated to a delicious dinner and welcome aboard briefing. Dive Briefing! The crew prepares everyone for a fabulous week of diving. Guests may enjoy up to four dives each day. Night dives are offered throughout the week; conditions permitting. |
| Day 2 | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Check-out dive at "Nawaikama Point". Diving is planned today at Gau; however that will depend on the current conditions. Otherwise, two dives will be done at "Nagali Passage" and one dive at "Jim's Alley". Night dive will be done at "Harold Bay" - depending on request from guests. |
| Day 3 | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Diving all day around the Wakaya area. |
| Day 4 | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Diving around Vatu I Ra. First dive at "HI 8" and second dive at "E6". "Mellow Yellow" and "Gomo" are new dive sites in this area where the 4th & 5th dives are done. Night dive will be done at "Alacrity" - another new dive site. |
| Day 5 | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Diving today is planned for Vatu I Ra passage. In the morning we try to visit "Adi Sere 1" followed by "Adi Sere 2". In the afternoon we visit "Human Nature" and a fourth dive at "Cats" Night dive will be done at the Main Reef. |
